## INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Directors of the Pittsburgh Community Benefit Fund

### *Opinion*

We have audited the financial statements of the Pittsburgh Community Benefit Fund (the "Entity"), which comprise:

- the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2021;
- the statement of operations for the year then ended;
- the statement of changes net assets for the year then ended;
- the statement of cash flows for the year then ended; and
- notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

(Hereinafter referred to as the "financial statements").

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements, present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Entity as at December 31, 2021, and its results of operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

### *Basis for Opinion*

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the "**Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements**" section of our auditors' report.

We are independent of the Entity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.



### ***Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements***

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Entity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Entity's financial reporting process.

### ***Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements***

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion.

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists.

Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.

We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditors' report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Entity to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
- Communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

Notes to Financial Statements

Year ended December 31, 2021

---

The Pittsburgh Community Benefit Fund (the “Fund”) is incorporated without share capital under the laws of Ontario. Its principal activity is to fund projects that will enhance the quality of life of residents in the former Township of Pittsburgh. The Fund is a not-for-profit organization under the Income Tax Act (Canada) and, as such, is exempt from income taxes.

## 1. Significant accounting policies:

The financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations in Part III of the CPA Canada Handbook – Accounting.

### (a) Revenue recognition:

Investment income, which is recorded on the accrual basis, includes dividends and interest earned on investments.

### (b) Financial instruments:

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value on initial recognition. Equity instruments that are quoted in an active market are subsequently measured at fair value. All other financial instruments are subsequently recorded at cost or amortized cost, unless management has elected to carry the instruments at fair value. The Fund has elected to subsequently carry all of its investments at fair value.

Transaction costs incurred on the acquisition of financial instruments measured subsequently at fair value are expensed as incurred. All other financial instruments are adjusted by transaction costs incurred on acquisition and financing costs, which are amortized using the straight-line method.

Financial assets are assessed for impairment on an annual basis at the end of the fiscal period if there are indicators of impairment. If there is an indicator of impairment, the Fund determines if there is a significant adverse change in the expected amount or timing of future cash flows from the financial asset. If there is a significant adverse change in the expected cash flows, the carrying value of the financial asset is reduced to the highest of the present value of the expected cash flows, the amount that could be realized from selling the financial asset or the amount the Fund expects to realize by exercising its right to any collateral. If events and circumstances reverse in a future period, an impairment loss will be reversed to the extent of the improvement, not exceeding the initial carrying value.

## 1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

### (c) Use of estimates:

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

### (d) Net realized gain (loss) on sale of investments:

The net realized gain (loss) on sale of investments is the difference between proceeds received and the average cost of investments sold less investment fees.

### (e) Unrealized gain on investments:

The unrealized gain on investments is the net change between the fair market value and book value of investments.

## 3. Financial risks and concentration of risk:

The Fund manages its investment portfolio to earn investment income and invests according to a Statement of Investment Policy approved by the Board. The Fund is not involved in any hedging relationships through its operations and does not hold or use any derivative financial instruments for trading purposes.

### 3. Financial risks and concentration of risk (continued):

The Fund believes that it is not exposed to significant interest-rate, market, credit or cash flow risk arising from its financial instruments.

Additionally, the Fund believes it is not exposed to significant liquidity risk as all investments are held in instruments that are highly liquid and can be disposed of to settle commitments. The fixed income securities in the form of guaranteed investments certificates have maturity dates ranging from January 10, 2022 to December 9, 2024 and interest rates ranging from 1.55 % to 1.61% (2020 - 1.20% to 1.45%)

Investments that trade in foreign markets are exposed to currency risk as the price in local terms on the foreign stock exchange is converted to Canadian dollars to determine fair value. The Fund's overall currency positions are monitored regularly by the portfolio manager.

There are no significant changes in risk exposures from 2020.

### 4. Capital management:

The main objective of the Fund is to provide support, benefits, and assistance to the residents of the community. The Fund fulfils its primary objective by adhering to specific investment policies outlined in its Statement of Investment Policy which is reviewed regularly by the Investment and Finance Committee. The Fund manages net assets by engaging knowledgeable investment managers who are charged with the responsibility of investing existing funds in accordance with the approved Investment Policy Statement.

### 5. Grants payable:

#### (a) Grass Creek Park:

In November of 2017, the Fund approved support for the construction of washrooms at Grass Creek Park, in agreement with the City of Kingston. A maximum amount of \$499,000 is to be paid in six equal installments over six years. Payments will be made on the anniversary of the commencement date. The Fund had up to the commencement date to provide approval of the final design of the Project, or the agreement would be deemed terminated.

The project commenced in 2019. Payments totaling \$249,500 have been completed, with the remaining balance of \$249,500 accrued in grants payable on the Statement of Financial Position.

## 5. Grants payable (continued):

### (b) Splash Pad:

In February of 2018, the Fund approved support towards a splash pad at Kingston East Community Centre, in agreement with the City of Kingston. A maximum amount of \$300,000 is to be paid in five equal installments over five years. Payments will be made on the anniversary of the commencement date. The Fund had up to the commencement date to provide approval of the final design of the Project, or the agreement would be deemed terminated.

The project commenced in 2019. Payments totalling \$180,000 have been completed, with the remaining balance of \$120,000 accrued in grants payable on the Statement of Financial Position.

## 6. Commitments:

In February of 2019, the Fund approved support for ongoing uniform and equipment replacement for the Pittsburgh Community Softball Association. The approved amount of \$12,500 will be paid in equal installments over the next five years. The first payment of \$2,500 was completed in 2019 and reported as a grant expense on the Statement of Operations.

## 7. Impact of COVID-19 pandemic:

In March 2020, the COVID-19 outbreak was declared a pandemic by the World Health Organization resulting in significant global and local impacts. As of December 31, 2021, the pandemic is ongoing which continues to have the potential to create financial stress on the Fund. Although there was initial concern that the volatility in the capital markets, including fluctuations in the fair value of investments and investment income would negatively impact the Fund, investment returns have remained strong in fiscals 2020 and 2021.

At this time, the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic presents uncertainty over future cash flows, may cause significant changes to the assets or liabilities and may have a significant impact on future operations. An estimate of the financial effect is not practicable at this time. The Fund continues to monitor and assess the effect that COVID-19 will have on its operations and financial results.

## 8. Comparative information:

Certain comparative information has been reclassified to conform to the presentation adopted in the current year.
